Intended use

This ELISA kit applies to the in vitro quantitative determination of Human CLU concentrations in serum, plasma, urine, saliva. Please consult technical support for the applicability if other biological fluids need to be tested.

Specificity: This kit recognizes Human CLU in samples. No significant cross-reactivity
or interference between Human CLU and analogues was observed.

Background

Clusterin is a ubiquitous protein that is arousing increasing interest owing to its widespread diffusion and multifunctional role. It is composed of two 40 kD subments (NA1, NA2) encoded by a single gene, which hold together by disulphide bonds. The mature dimer has a molecular mass of 80 kD and is micro-heterogeneous in electrical charge due to glycosylation. This protein has been differently named as apolipoprotein J (ApoJ), sulfated glycoprotein 2 (SGP-2), glycoprotein III (GP- III), testosterone repressed prostate message (TRPM-2), SP-40, 40cytolysis inhibitor (CL1) and others [1].It is a component of the high-density lipoprotein (HDL) complex with putative functions in the transport of lipids, apoptosis, protection of cells from stress and, most important, in the regulation of complement activity. It has been postulated that clusterin is involved in a variety of human diseases including Alzheimer disease, brain injury following ischemia, nephrosis and myocarditis [2].

Test principle

This ELISA kit uses the Sandwich-ELISA principle. The micro ELISA plate provided in this kit has been pre-coated with an antibody specific to Human CLU. Samples (or Standards) and biotinylated detection antibody specific for Human CLU are added to the micro ELISA plate wells. Human CLU would combine with the specific antibody. Then Avidin-Horseradish Peroxidase (HRP) conjugate are added successively to each micro plate well and incubated. Free components are washed away. The substrate solution is added to each well. Only those wells that contain Human CLU, biotinylated detection antibody and Avidin-HRP conjugate will appear blue in color. The enzyme-substrate reaction is terminated by the addition of stop solution and the color turns yellow. The optical density (OD) is measured spectrophotometrically at a wavelength of 450 ± 2 nm. The OD value is proportional to the concentration of Human CLU. You can calculate the concentration of Human CLU in the samples by comparing the OD of the samples to the standard curve.

Note: All reagent bottle caps must be tightened to prevent evaporation and microbial pollution. The volume of reagents in partial shipments is a little more than the volume marked on the label, please use accurate measuring equipment instead of directly pouring into the vial(s).

Note

- Please wear lab coats, eye protection and latex gloves for protection. Please perform
 the experiment following the national security protocols of biological laboratories,
 especially when detecting blood samples or other bodily fluids.
- 2. A freshly opened ELISA Plate may appear to have a water-like substance, which is normal and will not have any impact on the experimental results. Return the unused wells to the foil pouch provided in the kit, store it according to the conditions suggested in the above table
- 3. Do not reuse the reconstituted standard and HRP conjugate working solution. The unspent biotinylated detection Ab working solution and other stock solutions should be stored according to the storage conditions suggested in the above table.
- 4. The microplate reader should be able to be installed with a filter that can detect the wave length at 450±10 nm. The optical density should be within 0~3.5.
- 5. Do not mix or use components with those from other lots.
- Change pipette tips in between adding of each standard level, between sample adding and between reagent adding. Also, use separate reservoirs for each reagent.

Sample collection

Serum: Allow samples to clot for 2 hours at room temperature or overnight at $2-8^{\circ}$ C before centrifugation for 15 min at $1000 \times g$ at $2-8^{\circ}$ C. Collect the supernatant to carry out the assay. Blood collection tubes should be disposable and be non-endotoxin.

Plasma: Collect plasma using EDTA or heparin as an anticoagulant. Centrifuge samples for 15 min at 1000×g at 2~8°C within 30 min of collection. Collect the supernatant to carry out the assay. Hemolysed samples are not suitable for ELISA assay!

Saliva: Remove particulates by centrifugation for 10 minutes at 4000×g at 2~8 °C. Collect the supernatant to carry out the assay. Recommend to use fresh saliva samples.

Urine: Use a sterile container to collect urine samples. Remove particulates by centrifugation for 15 minutes at $1000 \times g$ at $2 \sim 8$ °C.Collect the supernatant to carry out the assay.

Note for sample


- Samples should be assayed within 7 days when stored at 2-8℃, otherwise samples
 must be divided up and stored at -20℃ (≤1 month) or -80℃ (≤3 months). Avoid
 repeated freeze-thaw cycles.
- Please predict the concentration before assaying. If the sample concentration is not within the range of the standard curve, users must determine the optimal sample dilutions for their particular experiments.

Some recombinant protein may not be detected due to a mismatching with the coated antibody or detection antibody.

Reagent preparation

- Bring all reagents to room temperature (18~25°C) before use. Follow the Microplate reader manual for set-up and preheat it for 15 min before OD measurement.
- Wash Buffer: Dilute 30 mL of Concentrated Wash Buffer with 720 mL of deionized
 or distilled water to prepare 750 mL of Wash Buffer. Note: if crystals have formed in
 the concentrate, warm it in a 40°C water bath and mix it gently until the crystals have
 completely dissolved.
- 3. Standard working solution: Centrifuge the standard at 10,000×g for 1 min. Add 1.0 mL of Reference Standard &Sample Diluent, let it stand for 10 min and invert it gently several times. After it dissolves fully, mix it thoroughly with a pipette. This reconstitution produces a working solution of 100ng/mL. Then make serial dilutions as needed. The recommended dilution gradient is as follows: 100、50、25、12.5、6.25、3.13、1.56、0ng/mL.

Dilution method: Take 7 EP tubes, add $500\mu L$ of Reference Standard & Sample Diluent to each tube. Pipette $500\mu L$ of the 100ng/mL working solution to the first tube and mix up to produce a 50ng/mL working solution. Pipette $500\mu L$ of the solution from the former tube into the latter one according to this step. The illustration below is for reference. Note: the last tube is regarded as a blank. Don't pipette solution into it from the former tube.



4. HRP Conjugate working solution: Calculate the required amount before the experiment (100 μL/well). In preparation, slightly more than calculated should be prepared. Centrifuge the Concentrated HRP Conjugate at $800 \times g$ for 1 min, then dilute the $100 \times$ Concentrated HRP Conjugate to $1 \times$ working solution with HRP Conjugate Diluent

Assay procedure (A brief assay procedure is on the 12th page)

- 1. Add the **Standard working solution** to the first two columns: Each concentration of the solution is added in duplicate, to one well each, side by side (50 μL for each well). Add the samples to the other wells (50 μL for each well). Immediately add 50μL of **Biotinylated Detection Ab working solution** to each well. Cover the plate with the sealer provided in the kit. Incubate for 90 min at 37 °C. Note: solutions should be added to the bottom of the micro ELISA plate well, avoid touching the inside wall and causing foaming as much as possible.
- 2. Aspirate or decant the solution from each well, add $350\mu L$ of **wash buffer** to each well. Soak for $1{\sim}2$ min and aspirate or decant the solution from each well and pat it dry against clean absorbent paper. Repeat this wash step 3 times. Note: a microplate washer can be used in this step and other wash steps.
- Add 100µL of HRP Conjugate working solution to each well. Cover with the Plate sealer. Incubate for 30 min at 37 °C.
- Aspirate or decant the solution from each well, repeat the wash process for 5 times as conducted in step 2.
- 5. Add 90µL of Substrate Reagent to each well. Cover with a new plate sealer. Incubate for about 15 min at 37 °C. Protect the plate from light. Note: the reaction time can be shortened or extended according to the actual color change, but not more than 30min.
- 6. Add $50\mu Lof$ **Stop Solution** to each well. Note: adding the stop solution should be done in the same order as the substrate solution.
- Determine the optical density (OD value) of each well at once with a micro-plate reader set to 450 nm.

Calculation of results


Average the duplicate readings for each standard and samples, then subtract the average zero standard optical density. Plot a four parameter logistic curve on log-log graph paper, with standard concentration on the x-axis and OD values on the y-axis.

If the samples have been diluted, the concentration calculated from the standard curve must be multiplied by the dilution factor. If the OD of the sample surpasses the upper limit of the standard curve, you should re-test it with an appropriate dilution. The actual concentration is the calculated concentration multiplied by the dilution factor.

Typical data

As the OD values of the standard curve may vary according to the conditions of the actual assay performance (e.g. operator, pipetting technique, washing technique or temperature effects), the operator should establish a standard curve for each test. Typical standard curve and data is provided below for reference only.

Precision

Intra-assay Precision (Precision within an assay): 3 samples with low, mid range and high level Human CLU were tested 20 times on one plate, respectively.

Inter-assay Precision (Precision between assays): 3 samples with low, mid range and high level Human CLU were tested on 3 different plates, 20 replicates in each plate.



Troubleshooting

Poor standard curve	Improper standard dilution	Ensure briefly spin the vial of standard and dissolve the powder thoroughly by gentle mixing.		
	Wells are not completely aspirated	Completely aspirate wells in between steps.		
	Insufficient incubation time	Ensure sufficient incubation time.		
	Incorrect assay temperature	Use recommended incubation temperature. Bring substrate to room temperature before use.		
Low signal	Inadequate reagent volumes	Check pipettes and ensure correct preparation.

	HRP conjugate inactive or TMB failure	Mix HRP conjugate and TMB, rapid coloring.		
Deep color but low value	Plate reader setting is not optimal	Verify the wavelength and filter setting on the Microplate reader.
